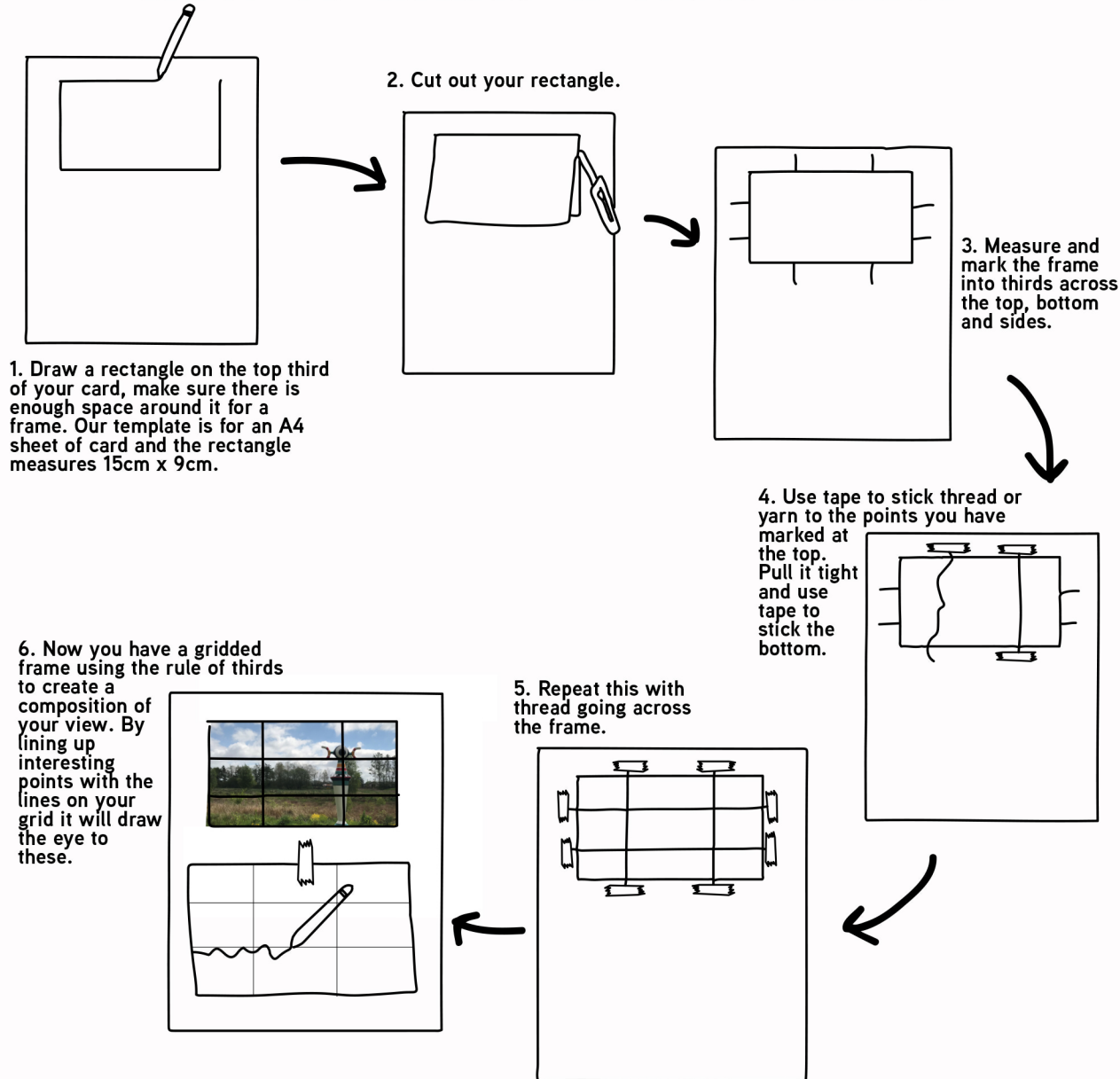

how to make a view finder



PLAY THE LINE

Make this view finder to frame the landscape for experiment #2. It creates a gridded view using the rule of thirds that helps you to focus on your layout. The rule of thirds is a general guide line that is used in painting, photography and design to create an interesting composition.

Art link: C. W. Eckersberg (Danish 1783-1853) was a painter and one of the founders of Denmark's Golden Age of painting. As a professor he encouraged his students to make direct studies in the landscape which revolutionised painting in Denmark at the time. His paintings are well planned out, he valued the use of maths in creating his compositions and wrote a guide book about the use of perspective.
